Miraculous Photo Of Pope John Paul II

We don't know why Pope John Paul II wanted to hide this picture for years. The Vatican published this picture recently, for first time. This picture was taken by one of his security guards just when the Pope was attacked and was falling down in his Pope mobile. You can see the pain in his face.



Take a look at the above picture. You can see Mother Mary holding John Paul II in Her arms when he was shot in 1981.

This happened on May 13, 1981. Pope John Paul II was shot as he arrived in St. Peter's Square to speak to the people who had gathered there. When he was shot, he was holding the rosary, which he always carried. When he fell to the ground, out of nowhere, a woman rushed to his side and embraced him. That picture is shown above. The picture is said to have been taken by one of the gathered people who was busy taking the Pope's pictures with his camera. The woman vanished as quickly as she appeared.

The gunman was apprehended in the square and sentenced to life in prison. The pope was critically wounded but survived after surgery and a long recovery. The surprising fact is that all the bullets passed just past his vital internal organs. When he recovered finally, the first thing Pope asked for was his rosary. When he got it in his hands, he said that he felt Mother Mary directing the bullets path through him. Sure, John Paul II was always in the habit of praying the rosary regularly. He had once said the best prayer I like is the Rosary.

Joaquin Navarro Valls, who is the one spokesman from The Vatican, said that they made a lot of studies for years of this incredible picture and of course about the quality of the developing of the picture because when it was developed nobody could see very well because the image was not clear. Finally, and after so many controls and being looking and checking by all the experts in photography (around the world), they decided that there were no tricks in it and today they give us this beautiful gift from our Mother of God. You can see the Mother of God holding John Paul II in her arms. Bishop Thomas Wenski recreated the picture on a glass window at his Florida residence.

Then it occurred to me I really didn't care because I do believe that the Blessed Mother was by the Pope's side protecting him. Editor's note:

The Knights of Columbus 128th Supreme Convention was held August 3rd - 5th in Washington DC..

The following pages contain notable presentations and keynote addresses from that conference. I thought it might be a good idea to include these for your reading so that we can once more pause and take stock of why we all have joined the Knights of Columbus.

This year's theme: "I Am My Brother's Keeper."

Knights of Columbus resolve to promote life and marriage, defend the Pope

"The Knights of Columbus renew our deep and historic commitment to oppose any governmental action or policy that promotes abortion, embryonic stem cell research, human cloning, euthanasia, assisted suicide, and other offenses

against life," the first approved resolution states.

"We continue to speak out to our elected representatives about the need to enact legislation to oppose these practices and to protect human life in all its stages," it adds.

The Knights also emphasized that they "support programs that provide women facing crisis pregnancies with alternatives to abortion, including adoption," and reaffirmed their "commitment to building a 'culture of life' by promoting policies that favor the family."

The world's largest Catholic fraternal organization also backed their long-standing policy of not inviting to any Knights of Columbus event, persons, especially public officials or candidates for public office, who do not support the legal protection of unborn children, or who advocate the legalization of assisted suicide or euthanasia." The ban on people who support abortion or assisted suicide also extends to the granting of awards or honorary positions within the Knights, and renting or allowing them to use facilities controlled by the organization.

The Knights of Columbus recalled that "the full guarantee of religious liberty cannot be limited to 'freedom of worship' but must include full 'freedom of religion,' which necessarily encompasses the public dimension of religion, the freedom from persecution or discrimination on the basis of conscience and belief, and the fact that believers are called upon to play an active role in building the social order."

"We will never waver in our efforts to promote the Church's understanding of religious freedom as an inherent right of all; and that we remain steadfast in our support of Article 18 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which declares that every person has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion, and that this right includes the freedom to manifest one's religion in teaching, practice, worship and observance," the resolution says.

During the final session, the Knights of Columbus also approved a resolution expressing "its profound gratitude to Pope Benedict XVI for his lifetime of dedicated service to Christ and his Church.

"We call upon the entire Order to express our solidarity with the Holy Father through a commitment to prayer, fasting and acts of charity for the intention that God may protect him from his enemies and grant him the courage and wisdom to guide the Church in these turbulent times," the resolution states.

The Knights of Columbus "will never waver in its commitment to defend the Holy Father and assist him in his pastoral mission of bringing the Good News of Jesus Christ to the world," the group stressed.

The Church Needs the Knights

Knights of Columbus should consider themselves to be the successors of the 72 disciples whom Jesus sent out to proclaim the kingdom of God, Cardinal Justin Rigali said in his homily for the convention Mass on Wednesday morning.

"You Knights must mobilize in the charity and truth of Christ, to support the Church and to be available to every brother and sister in need," said Cardinal Rigali, the archbishop of Philadelphia, who was the main celebrant and homilist.

Referring to the Gospel reading (Luke 10:1-9), he said that Knights of Columbus are vital members of the Church who bring the Gospel message through word and work in the world. Knights also receive their mission from the words of St. Paul in the first reading of the Mass (2 Timothy 4:1-8), he added: "Proclaim the word; be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient; convince, reprove, encourage through all patience and teaching ... put up with hardship, perform the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry."

The Mass was offered on the feast of St. John Vianney, the French priest who was the patron of the recently completed "Year for Priests." Cardinal Rigali said that St. John Vianney "did everything to promote the spiritual and corporal works of mercy, and was an apostle of the confessional."

He compared the saint to the Order's founder Father Michael McGivney, a Venerable Servant of God whose sainthood cause is before the Vatican. "Father McGivney lived his priesthood with the same ideals of pastoral charity" as St. John Vianney, the cardinal noted

In carrying out their mission, Knights have the great example of Father McGivney, who stressed the principles of charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism. The convention's theme – "I Am My Brother's Keeper" – is a perfect expression of Father McGivney's vision, the cardinal continued. "From this theme emerges a great challenge for the Knights of Columbus: to be in solidarity with every member of society."

In conclusion, he said, "The Church needs you, blesses you and urges you onward in the name of Jesus."

Pope to Knights: Best response to attacks against the Church is greater fidelity



Washington D.C., Aug 3, 2010 / 03:06 pm ([CNA/EWTN News](#)).- In an emotional letter sent by Vatican Secretary of State, Cardinal Tarcisio Bertone, on behalf of Pope Benedict XVI to the Knights of Columbus, the Pontiff said that the best response to the attacks against the Church is

a greater fidelity to Christ.

The Pope also used the fraternal organization as an example of loyalty to the Catholic Church.

In the letter, read during the first session of the 128th Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus in Washington D.C., Cardinal Bertone wrote that "in the face of often unfair and unfounded attacks on the Church and her leaders, His Holiness is convinced that the most effective response is a great fidelity to God's word, a more resolute pursuit of holiness, and an increased commitment to charity in truth on the part of all the faithful."

"He asks the Knights to persevere in their witness of faith and charity, in the serene trust that, as the Church embraces this period of purification, her light will come to shine all the more brightly (cf. Mt 5:15-16) before men and women of fair mind and good will," he added.

"At a time when fundamental moral norms, grounded in truth and inscribed in the human heart, are increasingly called into question and at times overturned by positive legislation," Cardinal Bertone continued, the Pope "is grateful for the efforts made by the Knights, in cooperation with other men and women of good will, to uphold the reasonableness of the Church's moral teaching and its importance for a sound, just and enduring social order."

In the letter addressed to Supreme Knight Carl E. Anderson, the Cardinal Secretary of State said that the Holy Father "once more thanks your Order for its witness to the sanctity of human life and the authentic nature of marriage, and for its efforts to promote in the Catholic laity a greater consciousness of the need to overcome every separation between the faith we profess and the daily decisions which shape our lives as individuals and the life of society as a whole."

Knights of Columbus pledges to help every Haitian child who lost a limb during the earthquake

The estimated 800 Haitian children who lost an arm or a leg because of the country's violent earthquake Jan. 12 will get prosthetic limbs and therapy courtesy of the [Knights of Columbus](#).

The effort, called Hope for Haiti's Children, was first announced by Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson as he gave his [annual report](#) Aug.3 during the organization's convention in Washington.

More details of the two-year program were announced at a Washington press conference Aug. 4.

Estimated to cost at least \$1 million, the Knights are partnering with the University of Miami's [Project Medishare for Haiti](#) to make the prosthetic devices available.

Each child will receive three prosthetics and all necessary therapy during the two-year period.

Earlier this year, the Knights teamed up with the California-based [American Wheelchair Mission](#) to deliver more than 1,000 wheelchairs to Haiti for people who suffered crushing injuries in the quake. The wheelchairs were donated to patients at a field hospital at the Port-au-Prince airport operated by the University of Miami.

The Knights also plan to deliver another 1,000 wheelchairs over the next several months.

"Each and every one of these children will receive a new start in life thanks to the Knights of Columbus," Anderson told the convention delegates.

This Band of Brothers

By Supreme Knight Carl E. Anderson

Many of the men who founded the Knights of Columbus were veterans of the American Civil War. James Mullen, the first Supreme Knight, was a sergeant in Company C of the Ninth Regiment, Connecticut Volunteers, having become a soldier when the war began, at the age of 18.

Nearly two decades passed between the end of the Civil War and the founding of the Knights of Columbus, but our Order was unquestionably influenced by their experience of the war and its aftermath.

War is always a wrenching and terrible experience, but this one took more than half a million lives in a country whose total population was just 30 million. More than 8,000 were killed in a single battle just 75 miles north of Washington, at Gettysburg.

They were, in the words of historian Bruce Catton, "citizen soldiers who, even after two years of war, would insist on remaining more citizen than soldier." The men who fought it were volunteers, and units were formed from local communities where the men had known one another all their lives.

North or South, blue or gray, at war's end the survivors were determined to build a better world. It would be a world where the ideals expressed in the Declaration of Independence – that all men are created equal, and that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights – would finally be realized.

In his second Inaugural Address, just weeks before the end of the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln vowed that despite the terrible slaughter, a reunited America would rebuild "with malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right," and that we would "care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan, to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations."

Who can doubt that young Michael McGivney, age 12, and James Mullen, age 21, were profoundly influenced by that speech? When they joined to form the Knights of Columbus in 1882, "charity for all" became our first principle. Where their young lives had been threatened by division and war, unity became our second principle. And what is "a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations," but a concise

description of universal brotherhood, also known as fraternity.

Father McGivney, James Mullen, and the other men who gave life to the Knights of Columbus were a "band of brothers" with a vision of what our world could become, a vision informed by both the experience of war and their deep faith in Divine Providence. They envisioned a society built on a foundation of brotherhood and love of neighbor, of being "our brother's keeper." It was no easy path in a nation that had been torn from one end to the other by war, but no doubt they felt deeply Lincoln's words, spoken during his address at Gettysburg, "that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom."

Today, we follow in their footsteps; more resolute than ever. We remain a Band of Brothers, working together to build a Civilization of Love that brings the charity, unity and brotherhood to a world in desperate need.

During the past year, I have walked with brother Knights on pilgrimage in Poland and visited councils in Japan, attended our national convention in Cebu City in the Philippines and met with brother Knights in Guadalajara and in Edmonton and in Parliament House in Ottawa as well as Los Angeles, Milwaukee and Philadelphia.

I have heard the Knights of Columbus praised by the former prime minister of Italy for the many contributions we have made to his country, and I have heard the Knights of Columbus thanked by homeless families in Luzon and by the poor and suffering in a tent hospital in Haiti.

My brother Knights, I report to you today that our Order is strong, it is vibrant and it is changing lives for the better in a thousand different ways around the globe.

Our work continues.

Our mission continues.

Father McGivney's vision continues.

Let us so resolve this week that together we will continue this great work of building a global culture of life and love where the pledge, "I am my brother's keeper" will be a reality for all – a civilization of brotherhood, unity and charity.
