## SISTER MARY ANN'S GASOLINE



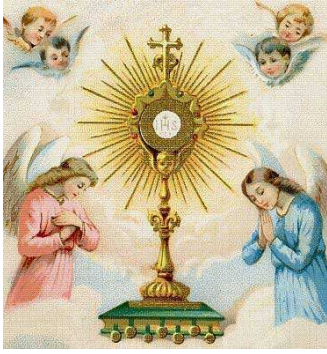

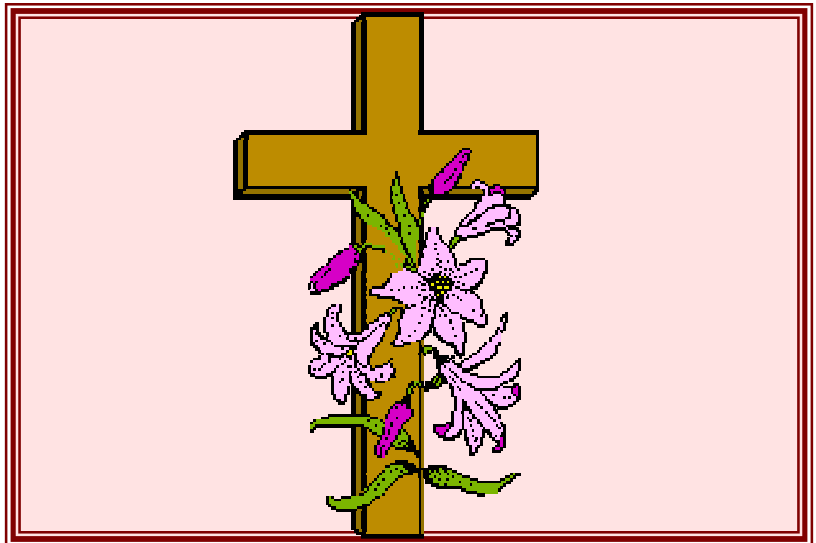

## Knights of Columbus Wins Pledge of Allegiance Case in Federal Appeals Court

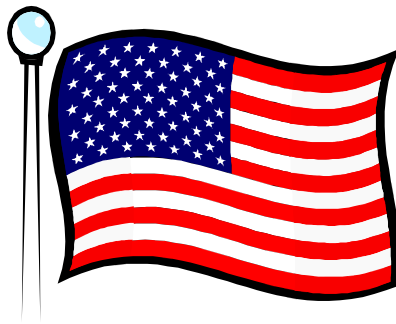
(SAN FRANCISCO, CA, March 15) - The Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled today that the words "one nation under God" in the Pledge of Allegiance "do not violate the Establishment Clause" of the First Amendment to the Constitution.

The Knights of Columbus led the campaign to add the words "under God" to the Pledge in the early 1950s, and the trial court agreed to allow the Knights of Columbus to join the present case as defendants when it was originally filed in 2005.

"This decision is a victory for common sense," Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson said. "It is also a welcome reversal of the Ninth Circuit's 2002 decision in a similar case that was ultimately thrown out by the Supreme Court on technical grounds. Today, the Court got it absolutely right: recitation of the Pledge is a patriotic exercise, not a religious prayer. Best of all, the Court said that the words 'under God' add a 'note of importance which a Pledge to our Nation ought to have and which in our culture ceremonial references to God arouse.' Every reasonable person knows that, and today's decision is a breath of fresh air from a court system that has too often seemed to be almost allergic to public references to God. This is a very good day for America," Anderson concluded.

In today's ruling, the Court noted that, "Among the 'self-evident truths' the Framers believed was the concept that all people are entitled to certain inalienable rights given to them by the 'Laws of Nature and Nature's God' and that the purpose of government should be to 'secure those rights.'" Such beliefs provide the context in which the words of the Pledge must be understood, the Court said.

The Knights of Columbus and several individual Knights and their families were defendant-intervenors in the case, and the court's 2-1 decision incorporates many of the arguments presented to the Court by The Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, a public interest law firm that represented the Knights in the case. Oral arguments before the Ninth Circuit panel had been heard in December 2007. Other defendants in the case included the United States government and a Sacramento-area school district



## Pelosi Lies About Catholic Support

March 19, 2010 - Catholic League president Bill Donohue comments on remarks made by House Speaker Nancy Pelosi today:

Last year, when Nancy Pelosi went to see the pope, she was denied the opportunity to exploit him: photographers were not invited into the room for the typical photo session. Instead, Pope Benedict XVI reminded her of the duties expected of public Catholics. But her determination to play the Catholic card - oh, so selectively - rebounded again when she informed the media that today is the feast of St. Joseph, a special day of prayer for workers, and especially Italians. She apparently stopped short of blessing herself, though she didn't stop short of invoking St. Joseph's name in support of the health care bill. Separation of church and state fanatics who suffered apoplexy whenever George W. Bush dropped the Lord's name are not expected to take to the streets.

Then Pelosi lied. She said she is grateful for the support of 60 orders of nuns, not mentioning that the letter she received had a whopping total of 55 signatories. Worse, she had the gall to say that this represents "every order you can think of." Wrong. In fact, there are 793 religious communities, which means she heard from seven-and-a-half percent of them. Moreover, since there are approximately 65,000 nuns in the U.S., that means she was contacted by .0008 percent of them.

In other words, not only are the bishops formally opposed to the bill she champions, it's a lie to maintain that the nuns are on her side. Shameless is too kind a word to use to describe what Pelosi did today.

# PUTTING THE "CARE" BACK IN HEALTH CARE

## Why Abortion Is Central to the Debate

**For months debate has raged in the United States over the proposed health care overhaul. Several contentious issues have emerged including the proposal's cost, the level of government control it would create, and most notably, coverage of abortion.**

The leadership of both the House of Representatives and the Senate have seemed determined in recent months to make coverage of the taking of a life in abortion the sine qua non for health care reform.

A core group of pro-life Democrats, led by Representative Bart Stupak of Michigan -- a member of the Knights of Columbus -- has stood on principle and joined with the Republican minority in opposing the bill for its inclusion of abortion, and that coalition may well prove able to stop the abortion-laden health bill.

But why have Congressional leaders been willing to risk the entire legislation for the sake of abortion?

Many have seen this focus on covering abortion as interest group politics at its worst: Politicians playing to a small base in the face of massive majority opposition to abortion and health care funding of abortion by the American people. That may be true.

But speaking to [National Review Online](http://National_Review_Online) last week, Representative Stupak revealed another, even more alarming reason: There is a belief among some in favor of the health bill that aborting children now will save money in terms of long-term health costs later.

What he's hearing from some party members, Stupak told National Review Online is that "if you pass the Stupak Amendment, more children will be born, and therefore it will cost us millions more."

"That's one of the arguments I've been hearing," He added. "Money is their hang-up. Is this how we now value life in America? If money is the issue -- come on, we can find room in the budget. This is life we're talking about."

Abortion is no longer being spoken of just in terms of rights; it's now become for some of America's leaders a matter of cost. A child aborted today, won't need surgery or long term care tomorrow.

### Calculating the cost

Pope John Paul II warned us that such calculations were what created a "culture of death." He wrote in "Evangelium Vitae": "This culture [of death] is actively fostered by powerful cultural, economic and political currents which encourage an idea of society excessively concerned with efficiency. Looking at the situation from this point of view, it is possible to speak in a certain sense of a war of the powerful against the weak: a life which would require greater acceptance, love and care is considered useless, or held to be an intolerable burden, and is therefore rejected in one way or another. A person who, because of illness, handicap or, more simply, just by existing, compromises the well-being or life-style of those who are more favored tends to be looked upon as an enemy to be resisted or eliminated. In this way a kind of 'conspiracy against life' is unleashed" (No. 12).

To create such a culture of death is bad enough, but to do so with the goal of economic growth is equally illusory.

Ironically, those who would dispose of the weak today to save money on health care tomorrow would actually create a society in which true economic growth is unsustainable -- a system both morally and monetarily bankrupt.

The proof that abortion and a mindset that precludes life are not only bad moral policy, but bad fiscal policy as well is all around us. As we face a severe recession, it's clear that declining birth rates have not created sustained -- or sustainable -- growth.

### Trade offs

Far from being a fiscal solution, abortion -- along with the entire contraceptive mentality -- has proven to be a Faustian bargain. Human life today is traded for a better future tomorrow, a future made even more tenuous by the loss of those lives necessary to sustain society's future growth.

And other cautionary tales of the un-

intended consequences sown by such policies are becoming increasingly obvious. The March 4 issue of the Economist features a cover story on "gendercide," the increasing trend of societies with too few women -- as girls are selectively aborted. China is the largest case, but countries from Armenia to Belarus to Serbia to Singapore have increasing gender-skewed birthrates.

So does in India. In advertisements there, chillingly reminiscent of the health care debate in the United States, the Economist article points out that doctors have advertised ultrasounds to determine a child's sex as follows: "Pay 5,000 rupees (\$110) today and save 50,000 rupees (\$1,100) tomorrow' (the saving was on the cost of a daughter's dowry)."

The article points out that parents who shied away from infanticide of baby girls, embraced aborting them by the millions. Society after society has bought into the idea of taking a life today for some perceived benefit tomorrow.

With such dire consequences worldwide, the leadership in Congress should take notice.

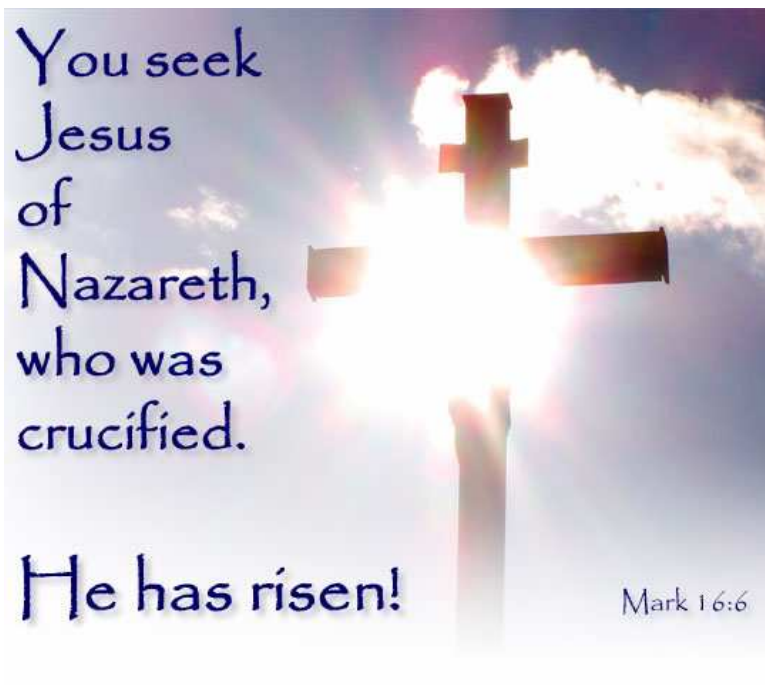
A health care system, willing to sacrifice tomorrow's children for today's financial gain, a system more concerned about costs than people can hardly be called health "care."

Americans, born and unborn, deserve better than to be seen in terms of their cost. The American people deserve a health care system that truly supports health, that upholds the dignity of all -- a system that leads to the protection -- rather than the depletion of --- America's most important resource, its people. That is the fundamental reason why so many Americans supported the idea of health care reform in the first place. As Washington draws closer to enacting a new law, it should keep faith with that promise.

Any proposal that offers less isn't worth the cost in terms of human life -- and promises a tomorrow more troubled than today.
